## **CAMPUS**

EPAA is located in a state-of-the-art facility in the heart of East Palo Alto, and features:

- College and Career Center hosts visits from college representatives throughout the school year
- Annual field trips to colleges
- Free Early College Program: Cañada College courses taught by Cañada professors for college credit, offered for free on campus through the Early College program



- College Scholarships: In 2017–18, 45 EPAA seniors and graduates earned \$500,000 in college scholarships from an education foundation dedicated to EPAA and its graduates. Over \$2.4 million awarded since 2007.
- College Admission: EPAA graduates regularly admitted to UCs, CSUs, and prestigious private colleges
- Advisory program for all students (socialemotional learning, college readiness support, academic monitoring).
- Small class sizes allowing for personal attention
- Personalized college coaching and advice Free SAT preparation
- Career Day
- Summer Bridge for incoming 9th grade students.
- College-bound curriculum aligned with the Common Core State Standards and the UC/ CSU A-G requirements, including English, history, language, mathematics, laboratory science and fine arts.
